

historical Shippets by Lethelthritha of Whitey

Almost 400 years ago, a well-known artist of the Current Middle Ages, died. This March 17th, let's not wear green, but black and white. And let every eye give praise to Amman.

You do know Jost Amman, don't you? Jodocus Ammann, to his family, which he joined on June 13, 1539, in Zurich. Though, perhaps it should be stated that his father latinized their surname to "Ammianus", due to his being a professor of "logic, rhetoric, Latin and Greek".

Jost settled in Nuremburg around 1561 and replaced Virgil Solis, after Solis's death, as the chief artist of the famous Frankfurt printer and publisher Sigmund Feyerakend (1528-1590). Jost lived in Zurich until his death March 17, 1591. Married twice, four children (two died before his own death), became a citizen of Nuremburg in 1577, and though welcomed as a famous artist and excellent a painter, and designer of copper plate engravings, upon his death had little to leave to his widow and two surving children, both daughters.

Jost was a prolific artist and probably worked on the drawings and left the tedious wood cutting to others, though he was skilled at wood cutting, as well as, copper engraving. The scope of his work was broad, as he wrote and taught as well as, illustrated books. Everything he did seems to have a practical application, teaching painting, expounding on architecture, illustrating a horse breeding book, documenting the entry of Emperor Maxmillian II into Nuremburg, on a series of connected leaves, in a band only fourteen and a half inches high, yet fifteen feet long, more than four hundred and fifty persons and animals are depicted.

Amman gave the Nuremburg denizens what they wanted in publications. Pleasure and information were provided in harmonious compisitions done with painstaking care. And Jost continues to be a commercial artist to this day.

His work appears on the front of the programs of the local Renaissance Festival, and often shows up in THE MEWS. We all enjoy his work and perhaps we don't link his name with the pleasure we receive. So, when March 17 comes, don your black and white and remember that those woodcuts with German Renaissance garb and vigorous horses, often with fully armoured Knights on them, are from Jost Amman's hand.
