- 3. Have a quarterly "moot" we might use this as a training ground for new autocrats. We could have a Saturday "mini-event" that would emphasize Arts & Sciences and fighting.
- 4. After a few "moots" or sewing sessions, we would have more appropriate garb at meetings. This is self explanatory.
- 5. Limiting mundane discussions and speaking in a forsooth manner. This is also self explanatory.

Finally, it's Thursday night; I thought it would never get here. Tonight I can forget my mundane troubles, see some friends and enjoy myself. Having parked my car in front of Umrath Hall at Washington University, I look at my watch and see that it is 7:30 p.m. just a half hour before the meeting is to begin. As I walk toward the hall, the sun is saying its last good byes till the 'morrow as its rays glisten off Umrath's mullion window panes. The hall's time worn steps and castle-like towers are being engulfed by the shadows of night fall.

I enter Umrath Hall finding myself no longer in the year 1989 but existing in a mixture of time periods from 600 AD to 1600 AD it's good to be home. The hall's vaulted ceiling is supported by massive beams; banners with coat of arms are hanging from wrought iron scones around the room; the fireplace with its intricate carved wood above the mantle lays dormant; and the afore mentioned mullion windows add flavor to this transformation of time.

Men, women and children scurry about to greet and talk with each other before the meeting begins. The men's garb ranges from the simple T-tunic with pouches and daggers hanging from their leather or rope belts to the elaborate tabards with coats of arms emblazoned on them. The women are wearing a wide variety of garb—some have billowy chemises while others are dressed more formal, wearing their houpelande dresses that have high collars and large trumpet sleeves that flutter in the breeze of their every move.

It is getting close to time for the meeting to start now, so several women are hurrying with their baskets of food and feast gear; they busy themselves with the setting up for the dessert revel that is to take place tonight. The cakes, breads, and sweets all look so delicious. I wonder which of these enticing dishes I should sample after the meeting. Short bread subtlely (a Scottish shortbread with buttercream frosting); Damson (a plum and currant tart); or the parsnip Ryalle (parsnip mousse with almonds and wine).

Over against the wall next to the fireplace, a couple of barefoot children in their peasant tunics are staring in fascination as a man intertwines the metal links to complete his new chain mail shirt. From the corner of the door, sweet sounds

of recorders and guitars float to my ears as several musicians have gathered and are practicing new pieces of music. A man wearing a feathered fop cap bows to his lady and offers his hand for her to join him in dance, and they are soon joined by others. A couple of jugglers take up the center of the room practicing their skills to the delight of everyone gathered. A few women are near the front of the room making belts and tapestries on their homemade looms while others are doing intricate designs with their needlepoint.

Scattered throughout the room are people meeting one another and discussing various ways to make new garb; how to make better armor; as well as past events; fighting techniques; and the making of weaponry.

Suddenly, a hush comes over the crowd as the herald cries out "Oyez! Oyez! Heed the words of our seneschal" as the meeting is called to order. Everyone is anxious to start the meeting, for we've seen the dessert table, and there will be many who will be dancing afterwards to work off those delightful repasts.

Unto the populace of Three Rivers comes greetings from Lady Caroline:

As I have mentioned at meetings, there will be a day of classes at St. John's. The site fee for this event will be \$1.00. Since we hold meetings there monthly, I feel a map is not necessary. However, if you are fairly new or bad with directions, I will gladly give you directions to the site.

The courses will be basic sewing and fighting appreciation for non-fighters. Lady Corisander will have material at the meeting before the classes, and we will also take a field trip out to Fabric Warehouse before the class starts. The trip will start at 9:30, and will last approximately 1 1/2 hours, with lunch (bring your own) and sewing to follow. The sewing course will be for basic T-tunics, but if you wish to attempt something more complex, feel welcome.

The fighting appreciation course will start at 10:00 and go until Sir Cormac stops talking. If fighters would like to put on armour and fight in the park (weather permitting, otherwise indoors), that would be appreciated also.

For dinner, feel free to bring a dish that will serve at least 5 or 6. Although this is a pot luck dinner, to keep from winding up with all desserts or all vegetables (HA!), I would like for people to bring dishes as follows:

SCA first names starting with A-F bring a main dish.

SCA first names starting with G-S bring a side dish.

SCA first names starting with T-Z bring a dessert.

This is set up to be a very relaxed day. It should also be a learning day. After dinner we will have dancing and filk singing courtesy of Edouard and Countess Arwyn.

I hope that this day will encourage you to learn more about sewing and fighting. I would like for the Barony to hold these days at least once a quarter. I would also like for these sessions to be used to train new autocrats, so if you would like to hold a day of classes, please let me know and I will help you with a prospectus for the officers. Also, if you have an idea for a class please let me know.

Surviving an Arts & Sciences Compatition-V

I don't want to give the impression that mine are the only valid (or even common) reasons for entering contests, or that these purposes cannot overlap. I've used them only as examples, as a starting point. If I haven't scared you away from competitions, let me end this article with a few more suggestions:

Decide well in advance which contests you want to enter, and what you'll be entering. It's perfectly fine to use an entry you've had around for a while, one you never intended to enter in a contest. But if you do begin a project with a particular competition in mind, give yourself enough time to do it right. Do you really want to be finishing your entry in the car on the way to the event?

Ask for help. Talk to the Three Rivers Minister of Arts and Sciences. (Gerald: he's the guy quietly going pale as he reads this.) (Actually, now it's Corisander --ed.) He should be able to give you pointers about documenting aspects of your entry, and he might spot some flaw in your entry (like a line in your poem that just doesn't make sense) that you could correct before you give it over to the judges. Also, check with some experts in the art of science. They might be able to recommend some subtle emphasis that would make your entry stand out. (But be careful. Your expert might end up judging the competition)

And one last thing to remember: whatever your other purposes for competing, have a good time. The judges aren't going to laugh at your work (at least, they're not supposed to). You'll receive advice to make your next project better, you'll meet other gentles

who share your interests, and, hey, you might even win.
