

On the Origins of Salad by Jean duc Soupe Marquis de Salade translated by Ld. Daene MacPherson

Salads, as foodstuff, had their origin in the depths of antiquity. The eating of vegetable matter was no doubt practiced by our most primitive of ancestors. It so happened, that among his provisions for traveling he had certain smoked, slated meats of which he took small chunks and judiciously scattered them over his Salade.

Today, there are many different types of salads eaten every day. There are seafood salads, taco Salads, lo-cal salads, even HOUSE salads but we still pay respect to the "inventor" SALUBUS CAESAR...I mean we have all heard of the Caesars Salad...Haven't we?

Master Harold wished it to be known that there will be filk singing on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of the month at his home. Please arrive around 7:30.


Gwenneth wishes it to be known that on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of the month there will be serious singing of period pieces at her house. Please see her for more details.



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
